Epidemiologic Approaches to Veterans' Health

Epidemiologic Reviews, a sister publication of the *American Journal of Epidemiology*, is devoted to publishing comprehensive and critical reviews on specific themes once a year. *Epidemiologic Reviews* is ranked #1 out of 158 public, environmental, and occupational health journals. The theme of the 2015 issue (volume 37) will be Veterans' Health.

Submission of reviews is now solicited on content and method topics related to health issues such as exposure to Agent Orange and herbicides, Post Traumatic Stress Disorders and other mental health concerns, tobacco use, substance use disorders, neurological disorders, Alzheimer's disease and cognitive dysfunction, hearing loss, suicide, occupational lung diseases, diseases of aging including cardiovascular disease and cancer, traumatic brain injury, other deployment related injuries, infectious diseases, sex differences, health outcomes of health services implementation, etc. Please note that reviews on other aspects of veterans' health are also welcome.

Manuscripts can be up to 6,000 words exclusive of the abstract, tables, figures, and references. All papers must be reviews of studies that are mostly epidemiologic in nature; a report of a single study is not acceptable. Give explicit details of the method of literature search, and use systematic reviews or meta-analysis when appropriate.
